



MARINE INSPECTOR

Main tasks and responsibilities

Marine inspectors inspect ships and craft to ensure compliance with standards and regulations. They approve plans before vessel construction, modification or repair, and are responsible for checking safety, navigation, loading/unloading and mechanical systems. They may also be asked to give their expert opinion on problems or defects observed during their inspections, their goal being to continually increase marine transport safety.

Academic training or professional development

Candidates must complete a college program in navigation, marine engineering techniques or naval architecture techniques. Then, they must accumulate several years' experience as a Navigation Officer, Marine Engineer or Naval Architecture Technician.

Once candidates have acquired sufficient experience, they can apply to become career Marine Inspectors.
